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Awards in Bronze

A special event is in need of a special trophy. When the 2017 Maryland-bred champions and the state's top owner, trainer and jockey are announced at the first Maryland Thoroughbred Industry Renaissance Awards in February, the recipients will be handed a piece of art.

Specially created by artist Peggy Kauffman, the Renaissance Award is a striking bronze of an exquisite Thoroughbred head. Kauffman noted it was her desire "to portray a beautiful Thorough-

bred horse with a contemporary look to the composition of the sculpture." She made the piece "sculptural to view from all angles."

In the fall of 2017, in a cooperative effort between the Maryland Horse Breeders As-

sociation, Maryland Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association, and the Maryland Jockey Club, details were coming together to create an annual event to celebrate the previous year's industry leaders. The date and location of the

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awards dinner was set for Feb. 12 at Sagamore Pendry Baltimore along the waterfront in historic Fell’s Point.

Thoughts turned to the award to be presented. MHBA executive director Cricket Goodall had seen the work of New York artist Kauffman on display at last fall’s “Art for Land’s Sake” benefit for the Valleys Planning Council. Kauffman, an accomplished horsewoman, has been a portrait artist of more than 30 years who works in bronze sculpture and pastel painting.

In addition to her portraiture, she has created trophies that are presented at Fair Hill Races, and for horse show events in New York. Goodall inquired about the possibility of having her produce a trophy that would be finished in time for the February dinner. In addition to creating a sculpture, the foundry process had to be factored in.

“When Cricket called me to ask if there was a chance, I didn’t have anything in my repertoire that could be cast as a trophy. So I knew I just had to build something, send pictures and see if they were interested,” said Kauffman.

“It was fun to construct since I had the freedom to go wherever the compositional aspects of it led me,” she added. “The curve of the neck, the eyes, the shape of the nose—there was no real detail I had to really tend to.” There is a suggestion of tack—a partial bridle and racing saddle—without going into detail, which adds to the dynamic of the piece.

“I love working like that—most of my work is a portrait. Being that I just did the head and the shoulders, it could be a little bit bigger than if I did a [complete] horse. So it’s got a good size and depth to it,” Kauffman added.

The bronze is approximately 11 inches long, 3½” inches wide and 8½ inches high, although a two-inch base will add to its height.

Kauffman has her bronzes cast at New Arts Foundry in Baltimore, which uses the lost wax casing process. It can take months from the time a piece of art in its clay form arrives at the foundry until the bronze is finished. Design and size are among the factors.

Kauffman’s fluid design made the casting a simpler

process—but many weeks were still required to complete the steps, which include creating a rubber mold of the clay model, pouring wax replicas using the mold and having Kauffman clean and touch up or “wax chase” the wax forms. A variety of “wax rods,” which are integral in order to pour the molten bronze, are then attached before the next time-consuming step: creating a ceramic shell.

The shell is created by dipping the wax form into slurry mixtures as many as seven times, and allowing it to dry in between coats, before the piece can then be fired (during which time the wax melts out). Liquefied bronze is poured into the resulting mold.

Once the bronze has hardened, the ceramic shell (known as the waste mold) is broken off. The artwork then goes through a variety of steps for cleaning (known as metal chasing), and welding if needed, sand blasting and finally the patina.

Kauffman, who makes the six-hour trip to Baltimore from her home in Millerton to oversee much of the process,

launched her career as an artist by first going to art school in New York before taking courses at the Maryland Institute College of Art, but noted her main education was “when I worked and rode for a [show] horse dealer in New York state for years,” said the former rider who competed professionally with show and event horses.

“I just knew horses,” she said. “When I was there, it was mostly Thoroughbreds. . . they would get Thoroughbreds off some of the cheap western tracks and have them shipped east.”

While she no longer rides, Kauffman owns two retired off-track Thoroughbreds, one a son of Affirmed.

“I’ve always been partial to them—that’s what I grew up with and always had,” she explained. “When you work for a horse dealer for that length of time and see all the horses coming in, you know exactly how a horse is put together to make it most suitable for a certain discipline—who would be a dressage horse, an event horse. . . that is the mainstay of my education.”

University of Maryland equine program experiences all that industry offers

Editor's Note: The University of Maryland operates a small Thoroughbred breeding program based at the College Park campus and a satellite farm as a way to help students learn about and gain experience in the industry. The program includes several broodmares, who are bred to Maryland stallions each year, and a sales division where weanlings/yearlings are offered at Fasig-Tipton Midlantic in Timonium. Associate professor of equine science Dr. Amy Burk provides a summary of the program's 2017.

I've spent a lot of time trying to figure out how to best sum up the university's breeding program in 2017. I can't quite put my finger on it, except to say that our experience is just as real and normal as anyone else's. There were some very good times when things went right for the students and the horses, and there were also somber and frustrating moments where nothing seemed to go our way.

We started on solid footing when our one yearling colt, Fearless Terp (Nicanor out of Daylight Lassie) sold for a respectable \$5,200 at the January mixed sale. We also reluctantly sold Runaway Pearl, a broodmare in foal to Bandbox, for \$1,000 because you sometimes have to cull the herd. Every year I'm impressed with how well our students handle the pressure of the winter sale. One of the highlights was when horseman Rodney Jenkins told the students they should be proud of themselves because they had one of the best turned out yearling colts at the sale. To hear that was truly an affirmation that their hard work was paying off. To date, our program has sold seven weanlings/short yearlings for an average of \$4,414.

After the sale, we refocused on our three pregnant broodmares and training a new batch of students about foaling. In early March, we set off

to Shamrock Farm for our annual newborn foal handling training. A few weeks later, after many restless nights of foal watch, our colt by Street Magician out of Daylight Lassie was born March 28. The foaling was every bit of normal, but we soon realized the foal was not meeting the benchmarks the students had memorized from the textbooks. He was unable to stand and nurse due to some flexural and angular limb issues. Under the advisement of our veterinarian and supervision of equine faculty, students provided him with around the clock care including bottle feeding, assisted nursings, leg wrapping and medication. By the fifth day, things looked to be shaping up with much of his leg issues corrected and he was standing and nursing on his own. Unfortunately, he started to become lethargic and soon had a high fever. Despite additional veterinary intervention and valiant care, he went septic and crashed too quickly to be saved. We said goodbye to Daylight Lassie's foal the following morning in what was a crushing experience for us all. That was a tough lesson.

A few days earlier, our first maiden of the season, Old Grey Square, had a gorgeous black filly by the Dutch Warmblood stallion Vallado. The dam was the most amazing helicopter mother we've ever seen. She wouldn't eat or drink because she was too busy protecting and hovering over her foal. Despite offering buckets of water by hand and strategically placing alfalfa in

hay nets all around the stall, she colicked. Luckily, some fluids and electrolytes sorted her out and she learned to take care of herself as well as her foal. The foal, on the other hand, started to have diarrhea and tests revealed the agent was *Clostridium difficile*. Although the students started to fear the worst, antibiotics did the trick and she was healthy in a few days. What a relief.

Our last mare, also a maiden, Liberty Bay, was due to foal April 6, but calcium and pH test strips both indicated that the foaling would not likely occur that night. The barn lights were turned off at 8 p.m. and foal watch was scheduled to begin again at 9. At 8:50, a student who had checked the foaling camera a few minutes early called to say that Liberty had foaled. I quickly logged into the system to see it for myself. There she was, a big strong bay Buffum filly lying sternal behind her resting mother. The call went out for all of the students assigned to the mare to quickly get to the barn so that they could execute their training. And just like that, our foaling season was over.

With the support of several owners and the staff at Northview Stallion Station and

Country Life Farm, our mares were re-bred to three top Mid-Atlantic stallions. Daylight Lassie was confirmed in foal to Jump Start. Liberty Bay was confirmed in foal to Golden Lad. And last but not least, Old Grey Square was confirmed in foal to Mosler. If all goes well, our 2018 foal crop will be our strongest. We are truly indebted to the many stallion owners and farm managers who have always said yes when we've asked for donated stallion seasons.

The summer and fall was a very busy time for students on our broodmare crew. One became the Maryland Million intern and assisted with the gala and races. A recent graduate participated in the Kentucky Equine Management Internship program. Three undergraduates participated in the new Maryland Thoroughbred Career Program sponsored by the Maryland Horse Industry Foundation. All in all, the students had an amazing experience meeting top-notch professionals while learning about the careers in the breeding and racing industry.

During the fall of 2017, we took 19 students to Laurel Park to get a tour from horsemen's relations director Phoe-

be Hayes and to meet with trainer Linda Gaudet, Maryland Racing Commission veterinarian Dr. Libby Daniel and Maryland Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association counselor and Beyond the Wire administrator Jessica Hammond. At the end of the semester, the majority of the class said the trip to Laurel was the highlight of the class. We've exposed 51 undergraduates, who would otherwise never have been to a racetrack, to racing via trips to Laurel.

In October, the broodmare crew worked hard to prepare our Buffum filly for the December sale including daily hand walking and free lunging. About two weeks out from the sale, a student noticed that the filly had torn a handful of skin down over her left hind cannon bone which ended up needing 15 stitches. Thankfully, there was no damage, but it meant we had to scratch the filly from the sale. Her sire, Buffum, has a small but loyal following and we're hoping to finalize a private sale of the filly soon.

In December, we graduated and said goodbye to two of our broodmare crew members as both headed off to the Kentucky Equine Management Internship Program. One was

assigned to Ashford Stud and the other to Shawhan Place. It's great to see our program serving as a springboard for students into the Thoroughbred industry. We have three students employed in the industry at Ashford Stud in Australia and Shamrock and Chanceland farms in Maryland.

Meanwhile, the work continues at home. We are working to sell our two Sport Horses, adjusting broodmare diets since they are in their last trimesters, and planning for the move of the broodmares to campus. During the quiet of January, I worked on redeveloping the Equine Reproduction class. Fourteen students, all new to equine breeding, are enrolled. In total, 71 students have been trained in equine breeding and sales through the broodmare crew and equine reproduction class. That's data to be proud of.

ious moments for Fred Wasserloos, George Greenwalt and trainer John Salzman Jr.'s Limited View as she romped to a front-running 6-length

score in the \$100,000 Maryland Juvenile Filly Championship Dec. 9. Deep Red, the longest shot in the field, held second over Vente to Go. Fa-

vorite Frechette was never a factor and wound up eighth.

A narrow second choice among 10 2-year-old Maryland-bred fillies, Limited View hit the wire after 7 furlongs in 1:23.94 under Hall of Fame jockey Edgar Prado, who has ridden the bay daughter of Freedom Child to each of her four victories.

It was the third straight win and second consecutive stakes for Limited View, who had to overcome a near-disastrous break and rally from as many as 13 lengths back to win the Maryland Million Lassie in October. She spent several mornings schooling at the starting gate in preparation for Saturday's race.

"Every time you never know what's going to happen. It's not one thing. Sometimes it's the paddock, sometimes it's the post parade, getting her to the paddock. The last time it was the gate," Salzman said. "My hat's off to the gate crew, Edgar, everybody that helped me along with her. She's a nice filly."

The first stakes winner for Freedom Child, Maryland's 2017 leading freshman and 2-year-old sire who stands at Country Life Farm in Bel Air, Limited View was bred by Barbara G. Smith out of the Not For Love mare Loves to Glance, whom Smith purchased for \$1,000 with the filly in utero at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic December mixed sale.

Smith showed Limited View at the 2016 Maryland Horse Breeders Association yearling show, where the filly finished third in her class of 29 judged by trainer John Servis. Sent through the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Fall Yearling sale, Limited View was purchased by Salzman for \$5,200 at the 2016. She now has earned \$177,096 from six starts.

Mark Sitlinger's Struth earned his second stakes victory in eight starts since being claimed for \$20,000 in mid-May at Pimlico, taking command on the turn and rolling to a 4¼-length triumph over Lewisfield in the \$75,000 Howard M. Bender Memorial Dec. 9 at Laurel Park. The chestnut son of Curlin completed 6 furlongs in 1:09.21.

"He's been a great claim. We got him back in May and he's won two stakes, so we couldn't be happier," Sitlinger said. "[Trainer] Kieron [Magee] and [his wife] Kelly do a great job and we're really happy to have him."

Struth recorded his first stakes win at Delaware Park in the Hockessin Stakes in July on Del 'Cap Day. Bred by Robert Meyerhoff's Fitzhugh LLC and campaigned by his breeder until the claim, Struth now has a record of 22-8-6-1 and earnings of \$341,075, with more than \$200,000 coming during his 5-year-old season in 2017.

Out of the Polish Numbers mare Star Number, Struth is a grandson of Meyerhoff's two-time Maryland-bred cham-

pion Star Minister, a graded stakes winner of \$458,650 who won or placed in 18 of 21 starts, and won seven stakes, topped by the Grade 2 Cotillion Handicap.

Star Number, a half-sister to stakes winner Concerned Minister, was unraced, but produced as her first foal stakes winner Hartigan, a daughter of Include who captured the Gin Talking Stakes at 2 and Pearl Necklace and Twixt Stakes at 3. Meyerhoff bred named seven foals out of Star Number, the last one Struth, before selling the mare at the 2014 Keeneland January All Ages sale.

Veterinarians Lenny Pineau and his wife Pat Bradley purchased Star Number for \$18,000. Barren for 2014 after being bred to Include, the mare has since produced a Graydar filly named Number the Stars, a \$75,000 RNA at the 2016 Fasig-Tipton Kentucky July yearling sale who broke



her maiden first time out at Laurel Park Oct. 20 and was fifth in the Maryland Juvenile Filly Championship for her breeders' Triple Tree Stable. Star Number missed to Munnings for 2016, but produced a colt by the same stallion last March and was bred back to Palace.

Marathon Farms home-bred Whirlin Curlin, fresh from a surprising maiden-breaking stakes win in the Christopher Elser Memorial two weeks earlier, pulled off another shocker by rallying through the stretch for a neck victory over Still Having Fun in the \$100,000 Maryland Juvenile Futurity for Maryland-breds on a snowy Saturday Dec. 9 at Laurel Park.

A son of Curlin trained by Gary Capuano, Whirlin Curlin was the only Maryland-bred juvenile colt or gelding in 2017 to win two stakes. Sent off at nearly 22-1

in the six-horse field, he was never far off the pace before making a four-wide move heading into the far turn of the 7-furlong test and digging in down the stretch. Maryland Million Nursery winner Clevver Mind, the 1-5 favorite, was 3½ lengths back in third. Final time was 1:23.96.

Stepping up against open company in his final start of the year, Whirlin Curlin was a lackluster fifth in Laurel's Heft Stakes Dec. 30.

A half-brother to 2015 Maryland Million Lassie winner Lexington Street (by Street Sense), also trained by Capuano, Whirlin Curlin is out of Lexington Girl (by Storm Cat). Peter Angelos purchased the mare in the name of Marathon Farm for \$70,000 at the 2013 Keeneland January Horses

of All Ages sale with Lexington Street in utero. Lexington Street made nine starts for her breeder, won three, was second twice and third once, earned \$145,217 and was sold as a broodmare prospect at last November's Fasig-Tipton Kentucky sale for \$140,000 to Bridlewood Farm.

Lexington Girl is the dam of nine winners from nine starters—all three foals of racing age bred by Marathon Farms are winners, the other the 3-year-old Friesan Fire filly Friesan Gal, a winner at Penn National in October. Lexington Girl was barren to the cover of Oxbow for 2016, and produced a colt by Palace Malice last spring. She was bred back to Daredevil.
