For two hours on a Thursday before Christmas, 40 students of the Maryland horse industry enjoyed an afternoon off from the daily grind, to attend a two-hour refresher course on racing and breeding in Maryland. The “class” consisted of the boards of directors of the Maryland Horse Breeders Association and the Maryland Million Ltd.

Think of a Venn diagram, two interwoven circles, like a small Olympics logo, symbolizing logical relations. Pencil in the Horse Breeders and the Maryland Million. Now imagine adding two more circles, for the Maryland Jockey Club and the Maryland Thoroughbred Horsemen’s Association, to comprise the entire Thoroughbred industry. Each related by birth. Each united under the Venn diagram. That is the shape of the game today in Maryland: inter-sected circles.

The lesson was taught in the Pimlico Room of Baltimore’s venerable Mt. Washington Tavern, a snowball’s throw from the second-oldest racetrack in America, in a room adorned with colorful racing silks, of Preakness winners, of famous Maryland-bred champions, of photos of Seabiscuit besting War Admiral in the unforgettable match race of 1938.

Presenters comprised a “Think Tank”:

1. Strategic communications firm KO Public Affairs;
2. Veteran MHBA lobbyist Dennis McCoy;
3. Governmental affairs firm Perry, White, Ross, and Jacobson (PWRJ); and
4. Documentary film company Rubicon Productions.

A late scratch was attorney Tim Maloney, for 16 years a member of the Maryland General Assembly, for the past 14 years in private practice, now counsel to the MHBA.

The “K” in KO stands for Steve Kearney, former communications director for Gov. Martin

O’Malley. Kearney believes that Marylanders are protective of their shared nostalgia. So he is crafting a communications campaign called The Colts Are Back, a trick play on words to recall a lost treasure, the Baltimore Colts NFL team, stolen away by a better deal out-of-state. A story familiar to the horse game, until Annapolis acted.

Kearney is aware that new stallions have arrived in Maryland for the 2014 breeding season. He shows a 60-second video of Maryland Million moments, racing to a dizzying climax as local horse experts repeat the refrain “The Colts Are Back.”

The “O” in KO stands for Damian O’Doherty. As a strategist, he is said to make water run uphill. KO Public Affairs started an Internet program called Center Maryland, hosted by O’Doherty. It is a lively news source landing daily in the in-boxes of influential Marylanders. Think of mornings in Annapolis, legislators clicking onto Center Maryland the way horse folks click the Thoroughbred Daily News. Daily briefings in the digital age. He is excited about an upcoming interview with Maryland Racing Commission chairman Bruce Quade, architect with his fellow commissioners of this new day in Maryland.

For 37 years, the MHBA has been represented in Annapolis by former House of Delegates member Dennis McCoy. He cautions:

“There are those in Annapolis who would like to take back the funds fueling your industry’s recovery. They will come at you again in 2014. You need to protect yourself. You need to build up your PAC war chest.”

McCoy elevates the MHBA’s Political Action Committee from backwater to mainstream. He is eloquent and gracious in his closing remarks to a grateful client. He steps down after the

2014 session, and his successor is the PWRJ firm, formed on July 1, 2013.

Oversimplified profiles of the young men behind the acronym:

Tim Perry served as Senate President Mike Miller's chief of staff from 2002-2006. Josh White ran the campaign for O'Malley's leap from mayor to governor. Justin Ross was 26 years old when elected to the House of Delegates, serving on the House Ways and Means Committee. Jonas Jacobson came up under Baltimore County executive Jim Smith, in the Department of the Environment.

Their website biographies reveal straight-line thinking, start-to-finish guys.

Wrapping up the four presentations was Rubicon, a Maryland non-profit specializing in documentary films. The company's Drew Perkins and Nick Carter are introduced by Maryland horse activist Jay Griswold, attuned to industry causes and the hard work necessary to fund them.

"Drew is working on a documentary spanning 350 years of Maryland Thoroughbred breeding and racing," Griswold says. "My friend Frank Bonsal and I have put up the seed money for this 'sizzler' you are about to see. We need the industry to step up and help us finish this film."

The screen comes alive with current events, interviews with Sagamore Farm

personnel, footage of Gelo Hall speaking of the Seabiscuit-War Admiral match. He was 11 years old.

"Those horses paraded as champions. They had 'eminence' about them."

The feeling in the room is magical.

On the screen, the history of the Thoroughbred in Maryland, as seen through the eyes of Perkins, a Ken Burns-devotee, a detail storyteller. And what a story it is, to tell, to preserve. To show to legislators in Annapolis.

Two years ago, the Mt. Washington Tavern burned down. One of the tavern's owners, Rob Frisch, is a racing fan. During rebuilding, he contacted Georganne Hale,

racing secretary for the Maryland tracks.

"Georganne dug into her address files, and we sent a card out asking for historic racing memorabilia," recounts Frisch. His Pimlico Room is a Maryland racing museum.

Griswold concluded the day with a question:

"Did you all know that President Franklin Roosevelt gave government employees the afternoon off so they could go to the match race at Pimlico?"

In the heart of the holiday season, the heart of the horse industry revived at the Mt. Washington Tavern. Once in a while, everyone needs an afternoon off to remember why they work.

University of Maryland breeding program sells first weanling class

The University of Maryland hands out thousands of diplomas every year, but not like these two. Weanlings Amazin Terp and Diamondback Fire, the first horses born at the College Park campus in 30 years, sold at Fasig-Tipton's December Mixed Sale at Timonium Dec. 9, taking their first steps toward careers as racehorses.

Foaled and raised largely by students in the Equine Studies classes, the weanlings went through the sales ring like others on the day—only with some special circumstances. Fasig-Tipton and consignor Bill Reightler waived their commissions and fees on the sales to help the fledgling program and buyers were informed of the special circumstances while the horses were in the ring.

Equine Science and Management professor Dr. Amy Burk watched it all and smiled, as documented by video cameras from the university's communications department.

"I was happy," she said. "One of the goals of the program was to just bring in some income to make us more sustainable. For the first year out, I was happy. There were start-up costs. They add up, and we brought in some income."

The filly Amazin Terp went first as Hip 125. The small bay daughter of Cherokee's Boy and the Conquistador Cielo mare Amazin walked like a professional and remained calm and composed while others around her acted nervous. She looked quick, light, balanced. She also looked like she had a whole lot of growing to do—which kept her price down. She sold for \$3,000 to Teresa Beste of Christ Is King Stable.

The buyer bought a nice horse, but also has a connection to the program as her son Johnny Weiss interned with Burk in 2013.

A few minutes later, Diamondback Fire strutted into the ring. The Friesian Fire colt drew attention because of his size, his look and interest in his new sire. Out of the Seeking Daylight mare Daylight Lassie, Hip 141 sold for \$9,000 to Louis Rao Jr.

While neither weanling set any records, it was a first step. The mares were donated by Maryland breeders Murmur Farm and Marama Farm, respectively. Burk and her Equine Reproduction and Equine Science students were there for the deliveries, imprinted the foals, did almost all of the sales prep (with some advice from Reightler) and took the horses to the market. Burk utilizes the small cam-

pus farm for foaling and other hands-on lessons, but the mares and foals spend much of their time on the university's 900-acre farm in Ellicott City. Burk carved out some space for horses on the property, home to a working dairy, pasture research projects and other related work.

The university is not equipped to keep horses beyond the weanling stage so Amazin Terp and Diamondback Fire went to the sales ring in December, even if both might have been more valuable later.

Burk appreciated the assistance along the way—from Reightler, Katy Voss, the mare donators and more—looks forward to building her program with more students and more horses. Daylight Lassie is in foal to Friesian Fire again. Amazin slipped early in her pregnancy so is not carrying a foal but a new mare, The Best Sister, was donated by Shamrock Farm and is carrying a Rock Slide foal due in February. Similar breeding programs have worked well at Virginia Tech, the University of Kentucky and University of Florida, so Burk is hopeful for the long-term success at Maryland. She's looking for another mare, but not just any mare.

"I have had a lot of people calling me, but I want a mare that improves the pedigree of our group and we only have one spot left," she said. "I need something that gives me a little oomph."

Reightler was impressed with the work done by Burk and her students and sees potential.

"The horses were prepared wonderfully," he said. "Amy's not a neophyte in this and they did a good job getting the horses ready. It was a good first foray into this."

MARYLAND-BRED STAKES WINNERS



Front-running Joint Custody wins Marylander Stakes

Konrad Wayson's Joint Custody broke alertly, quickly assumed the lead and then turned back all comers as he raced to victory in the 7-furlong Marylander Stakes for 2-year-olds Dec. 7 at Laurel to record his first stakes win. It was the son of Outflanker's third win from five starts, and increased his earnings to \$122,980.

Bred in Maryland by Janet Wayson, Joint Custody is the second foal out of Paying Off, a stakes-winning Maryland-bred daughter of Malibu Moon campaigned by Morgan Wayson and trained by Jerry Robb. Joint Custody, also trained by Robb, broke his maiden in his debut at Timonium in August going 4 furlongs and captured a 6-furlong allowance next out at Laurel before finishing second in the Maryland Million Nursery Stakes. 🍷

Slip and Drive all out to take Japan Racing Association Stakes

Jer-Mar Stable's Slip and Drive got his first stakes win in gritty fashion at age 5, contesting the lead from the start of the 1 $\frac{1}{16}$ -mile grass test and getting the victory by a nose over hard-charging Roadhog in the \$100,000 Japan Racing Association Stakes at Laurel Park Nov. 9.

Guided by Carlos Marquez Jr., the gelded son of Artie Schiller won in a solid 1:42.87 after pedestrian fractions of :25.78, :50.70, 1:14.67 and 1:37.15. One of the longest shots on the board, Slip and Drive returned \$46.20.

The winner shipped in from Delaware Park for trainer McLean Robertson.

In one previous visit to Laurel, the gelding finished fourth in the 2012 Laurel Turf Cup.

Bred in Maryland by John Crane Jr. and Margaret Crane, Slip and Drive has put together a solid career for owners Jerome and Martha Myers, who purchased him for \$57,000 at the 2009 Keeneland September Yearling sale.

An allowance winner in each of his three seasons, Slip and Drive was second in his stakes debut at Delaware Park in July 2012 and finished third in the Grade 1 Shadwell Turf Mile behind Horse of the Year Wise Dan and Willcox Inn that fall. Slip and Drive didn't return to the races until this past June when he finished second in the Brooks Fields Stakes at Canterbury Park. He won an allowance at Delaware Park in September, his only other win in six outings this year.

One week after the Laurel stakes win, Slip and Drive lined up for Aqueduct's Red Smith Handicap-G3 where he finished fourth. From 18 starts, he has six wins, four seconds and two thirds, and has earned \$315,865.

The bay gelding is the third stakes winner for his dam The Green Owl, by Carson City, who was owned by Margaret Addis Crane for more than a decade. The richest of the three stakes winners is Barbecue Eddie (by Stormy Atlantic), who didn't get his first stakes win until last January at age 9. The Dubai-based Maryland-bred gelding, winner of the Al Maktoum Challenge-Round 1-G2, has amassed \$942,828, and was Grade 1 stakes-placed in the U.S. before sold to Sheikh Hamdan bin Rashid Al Maktoum. Barbecue Eddie's full-sister, Stoupinator, also trained by Robertson, won the Northbound Pride Oaks last August and was third in Delaware Park's Forever Together Stakes in September. The 3-year-old Kentucky-bred has earned \$142,680.

The Cranes sold the 17-year-old The Green Owl in foal to Eskendereya at the 2012 Keeneland January mixed sale for \$50,000. 🍷

Howard Bender's Access to Charlie came out the winner of a three-horse photo in the 41st running of the Geisha Stakes for Maryland-bred fillies and mares at Laurel Park Nov. 9. The daughter of Indian Charlie dueled with Monster Sleeping to win by a neck, with fast-closing Mystic Love a head back in third. The race carried a \$75,000 guaranteed purse, with an additional \$25,000 for Maryland-sired runners.

Julian Pimentel was at the controls as Access to Charlie

got the first win of her 5-year-old campaign, completing the mile in 1:39.56 and paying \$5.60 as the favorite. It was the first stakes win for the Bender colorbearer since taking the Twixt Stakes a little more than two years earlier. Third in the Geisha in 2011, and fourth in last year's edition, she hadn't started since June.

"This horse was coming off a layoff so you never know how they are going to come back," said trainer Larry Murray. "She was training very well and I think she was as good as she ever was. She had run into some tough fillies before but we thought this was a good spot for her."

In her first three starts of this campaign through March, she finished second in the Maryland Racing Media Stakes and was third in the Nellie Morse and Conniver Stakes.

A second-generation homebred for Bender and his late wife Sondra, Access to Charlie is one of five foals to race, all winners, for Media Access (\$211,372, Miss Liberty S, etc.), and her dam's first stakes performer. Access to Charlie's second dam is the

Benders' foundation mare Foufa, a daughter of Storm Bird who produced five stakes winners for the Benders, including graded winner Foufa's Warrior.

Still in production, 15-year-old Media Access has a current yearling by Broken Vow, but lost her foal by Blame this year. She was bred back to Lemon Drop Kid.

In the 72-year history of the Jennings Handicap it had happened only once before. Sylvia Heft's Eighttofastto catch joined the legendary Little Bold John as the only three-time winners of the historic test, named for one of Maryland's all-time great horsemen, Preakness winning breeder/owner/trainer William Jennings Sr.

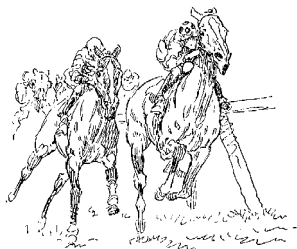
Taking control in the first quarter-mile of the \$100,000 1-mile test, Eighttofastto catch cruised home the easiest of winners, 6 lengths on top as the 4-5 favorite in the field of seven Maryland-breds. Wild Louis gave chase to finish second, and it was another 6 lengths back to Concealed Identity in third. Final time was 1:36.76.

In the midst of his best season, the 7-year-old once again had it his own way in his next start as he galloped to a 2-length victory in the \$100,000 Broad Brush Stakes Dec. 7. The win in the 1½-mile race contested over a muddy track was his third stakes win in a row, fourth of the year and 10th overall as the Tim Keefe trainee upped his career earnings to \$914,585 from 46 starts. The Not For Love gelding's fall streak began with a dominating score in the Maryland Million Classic at Laurel. Earlier in 2013, he won the Henry S. Clark Stakes at Pimlico.

Bred by Dark Hollow Farm and Herringswell Stable, Eighttofastto catch is one of three stakes winners out of the Nice Catch mare Too Fast to Catch, and the richest of her dozen winners.
